Bleeding and clotting disorders affect millions of people in the U.S. and impact all ages, races and socioeconomic groups. Health care teams at Hemophilia Treatment Centers (HTCs) have succeeded in making significant progress over the past 35 years in the treatment, diagnosis and comprehensive care of patients with bleeding and clotting disorders; however, some gaps in diagnosis, care delivery and outcomes still exist. Together, we are working to make the best care even better.

The National Hemophilia Program Coordinating Center (NHPCC) is creating a national collaboration of stakeholders to identify these gaps and to help standardize care, increase access to care and knowledge, share best practices and evaluate programs.

The NHPCC has:

- Built a robust infrastructure between regional networks to share expertise and best practices with consumer organizations, government and state agencies, genetic services and professional associations.
- Conducted the first-ever national provider needs assessment to identify training and resource needs of staff and to standardize the delivery of care.
- Conducted the first-ever patient needs assessments to identify gaps in services to improve access to care.
- Assessed gaps in genetic services and produced educational materials.
- Conducted the first national survey of the 340B programs to evaluate the benefits of the program in supporting the network.
- Supported four demonstration projects of national significance through Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) funding to develop best practices.

The NHPCC is led by the American Thrombosis and Hemostasis Network (ATHN) and serves as a bridge between the regional hemophilia treatment center networks to create value on a national scale.

NHPCC History

In June 2012, the Maternal and Child Health Bureau (MCHB) in the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) funded the American Thrombosis and Hemostasis Network (ATHN) to establish the first National Hemophilia Program Coordinating Center. The NHPCC is partnering with regional leadership, over 130 ATHN affiliate Hemophilia Treatment Centers, the National Hemophilia Foundation (NHF), the Hemophilia Federation of America (HFA) and other patient advocacy groups, federal government partners, 340B pharmacy programs, the genetics and newborn screening collaborative, payers and thought leaders to guarantee a community-wide perspective.

Get Involved

NHPCC work groups and committees provide a format to share ideas, data and expertise.

Advisory Committee – working to coordinate and evaluate the activities of the regional networks to optimize health of people with bleeding and clotting disorders.

Genetics Work Group – identifying gaps in genetic services and developing resources to fill them.

340B Work Group – collecting qualitative and quantitative data to demonstrate the importance of the 340B program income in sustaining and enhancing services provided to patients..

Needs Assessment Work Group – identifying the needs of patients seen at HTC and assessing the service needs of underserved populations.

Transition Work Group – identifying a national protocol to prepare adolescents to transition to adult care.

Staff Development Committee – establishing national guidelines to orient new HTC staff and enhance staff skills.

Quality Improvement Work Group – determining national and regional metrics to be monitored and used in quality improvement initiatives.

Projects of National Significance Work Group – awarding and monitoring quality improvement projects funded by the NHPCC.
